The successful re-release of "Oh Boy" Last year has prompted EMI to re-release "Drumbeat" (tv), which features the following John Barry Seven selections: "Bee's Knees", "Little John", "Mad Mab", "Rebel Rouser" and "Good Rockin' Tonight". EMI NUTM20... Warner Bros have issued a three record collection of movie themee, entitled "Love Themee" (K26122) "Action Movies" (K26120) and "Spectaculars". (K26121). Tracks include "Petulia", "Battle of the Bulge" and "Klute", which in the sleeve notes credit Jerry Goldsmith instead of Michael Small who wrote the score.

Dimitri Tiomkin Dies

Dimitri Tiomkin, 80, for four decades one of Hollywood's most prolific film composers and four time Oscar winner out of 23 nominations died of natural causes at his home in London. Composer of over 125 film scores and nominated for "best Score" Oscar 15 times, he was a winner on "High Noon" (1952), "The High and the Mighty" (1954), and "The Old Man and the Sea" (1958) his forth Oscar win was the song from "High Noon".

Tiomikin was also a leader in the field of composers salaries having received \$50,000 for "The Guns of Navarone" in 1961 which was an industry high at the time. He produced his own pet-project, "Tchaikovsky" in 1970 which florped.

Other outstanding scores for which he will be remembered include, "The Unforgiven", "The Alamo", "Duel in the Sun" and the classic 1937 score to "Lost Horizon". His autobiography entitled "Please Don't Hate Me" was published in 1959.
