BILLY LIES AGAIN

RE_TSSIED

The fictitious character Billy Liar, dreamt up by writers Keith Waterhouse and Willis Hall in the early sixties has had a long and successful outing in publishing, TV, radio, stage and film.

Famed director, John Schlesinger siezed upon the best selling book and transformed it into a brilliant urban comedy in 1963 with Tom Courtenay as Billy and a superb British supporting cast. Richard Rodney Bennett supplied the dramatic score.

In the seventies it was the turn of British television to present it's own interpretation of the character with a series based on the book. The show ran for several seasons and was largely very funny.

It was John Barry, who realised the potential of "Billy" as a stage musical and set to work with lyricist Don Black in finding the right people for the project. They included Barry's old friend Michael Crawford who took the lead and Patrick Garland who's first stage musical as director this was. The show bowed in Manchester in 1974 and quickly moved to the famous Theatre Royal, Drury Lane in London where it ran for two and a half years to packed houses.

At this moment both Barry and Don Black are at work in New York writing three or four new songs and revamping their previous material to better suit the American audience. The original show was of course set in Yorkshire, with it's largely brassy exterior score, which was fine - "The slag heaps and the slums" as Don Black termed it in his lyric.

If the show is a great success there will be a new cast album recorded which should differ from the CBS issue in 1974. Also, if in the case of the recent "A Chorus Line", a major company will pick up the rights to make it as a feature film.

For the future, John Barry has several other projects lined up to present on broadway watch this space.

SOMEWHERE IN TIME

You will, no doubt remember "Jams", but do you recall it's sequel, "Jams II" which Jeannot Szwarc directed? Well his latest film is called "Somewhere in Time", (which John Barry is to score for Universal Pictures.

The film is based on the award winning book, "Bid Time Return" by Richard Matheson, who also serves as screenwriter, and tells of a young man (Christopher Reeve) who falls in love with a picture of a beautiful woman (Jane Seymour) and discovers a way to travel back in time (1912) to find her.

The director describes the film; "it's a very old-fashioned film and I adore it. Everybody's so afraid of sentimentality these days. We've become cold and very unemotional. Well this is an emotional film. It's about idealistic love, which I think is the way it should be". To be fair to Szwarc he did make this statement before "Kramer V's Kramer" warmed our hearts and watered our eyes.

Details on a possible soundtrack release from the film will be advised near the time of the films release.
