ivalling the special effects and spectacular sets in importance is the music which accompanies every James Bond production. The movies have legions of fans passionately devoted to the memorable themes which have become a main ingredient in their success. Indeed, how could they begin the film without the familiar strains of the Bond theme accompanying the gunbarrel sequence which opens every entry in the series?

The man most associated with the music in Bond's world is composer John Barry, who has written an impressive twelve OO7 scores to date. A multiple Oscar winner (though, ironically never nominated for his work with the Bond series), it was Barry who made the first pop hit from a movie title song (Goldfinger). However, there have been other notable composers who have graced the world of OO7 with their own unique styles: former Beatles producer George Martin, Marvin Hamlisch, Bill Conti, Michael Kamen and Eric Serra.

For decades, Bond title songs have proven to be chart hits. Among the top title tunes: Live and Let Die by Paul McCartney and Wings; Nobody Does It Better by Carly Simon; For Your Eyes Only by Sheena Easton; and A View To A Kill by Duran Duran.
